Among other priorities, the Healthy Smiles Initiative focuses on closing the gap in care across the state. That includes providing incentives for dentists to live and work in rural communities where currently dental services are few and far between. It also pushes to expand class sizes in the state's dental schools to eventually increase the number of practicing dentists.

As major sponsors for the University of Tennessee Health Science Center College of Dentistry and Meharry Medical College School of Dentistry, we work with Tennessee's dental schools to make sure students are learning on state of art equipment and in facilities that resemble the types of clinics you all practice in, so those aspiring dentists will be ready to help provide care as soon as they graduate.

Those efforts to strengthen the oral healthcare of our communities coincide with our continued effort to provide a more valuable service, from the dentists that are part of our valued networks to the groups and individuals we serve. In 2022, about 400 new providers joined our PPO and/or Premier networks. Our growing networks of providers ensure that our members can find affordable dental care close to home. In addition, our expanding client base and membership ensure a large number of patients will be looking for a Delta Dental provider for oral health care. Delta Dental of Tennessee acquired more than 150 groups with more than 94,000 subscribers from January to October 2022, that's a 14.5% increase for the year.

We are not only excited about significant groups we have acquired, including the State of Tennessee, one of the largest employers in Tennessee. But also, we celebrate the major national companies like Amazon, Ford, and General Motors that are making significant investments in our state, basing employees here who are already Delta Dental members and will be looking to our network dentists for care.

This growth in membership numbers in turn increases the number of claims we process. We are proud to report that we continue to be one of the most efficient dental benefits carriers in terms of accuracy, speed, and cost of processing those claims. Performance reports for our customer service representatives show that 99 percent of claims are processed within 10 calendar days, and that is with a 100 percent payment and processing accuracy rate. We strive to continue meeting those statistics moving forward no matter the growth or changes we see along the way.

In the last year, Delta Dental of Tennessee has partnered with Farm Bureau to offer a bundled dental and vision product for the members of Tennessee Farm Bureau. This alone adds their 600,000 members with access to our plans, as well as a new Medicare Advantage plan with a \$3,000 annual maximum. We hope the impact of new alliances like this will be seen directly in the number of patients visiting you for care.

Navigating the white coat syndrome

he rite of passage for every health professional known as the White Coat Ceremony is similar in name to a phenomenon that can affect the patients of those professionals—the white coat syndrome. According to the Mayo Clinic, the condition occurs when blood pressure readings at a health

care provider's office are higher than they are in other settings, such as at home. It impacts an estimated 15 to 30 percent of people with high blood pressure readings in the dentist's office.

In addition, the CDC estimates that nearly half of adults in the United States have hypertension in general. Blood pressure measurement is an important screening vital sign at dental visits and can impact the way a dentist treats his or her patient. In

extreme cases, it could lead to delays in dental work and immediate referral to a physician to further assess the problem.

Sometimes that leads to the use of medication in treating hypertension, which can have oral side

effects of its own. One of those conditions is known as gingival enlargement, a condition that causes the gums to swell and grow over teeth eventually leading to severe periodontal infection if left untreated. Less severe, but more common side effects include dry mouth, changes in taste, and oral lesions.

It is important to ensure your patients are aware of these possibilities and stay on top of their oral health with regular checkups, in some cases more frequently than the recommended twice a year. In dealing with patients who experience white coat syndrome, some dental clinics offer sedation options including nitrous oxide, IV sedation, and oral sedation. Besides sedation options, some dentists are trying other ways to lower patients' risks of white coat

syndrome including exchanging their white coats for colorful scrubs and personal protective equipment to create a more relaxed clinical environment. Others find that simply communicating with patients can put them at ease.

Dentists assist in detecting developmental disorders

in kids

e know that overall health starts with a healthy smile, and researchers are examining another significant link to oral health: developmental disorders. A study published in the Pediatric Dental Journal looks at the necessity for screening for developmental disorders in children and ensuring that the children suspected of having them receive specific support, especially dentists' role in that screening.

Health checkups in pediatric patients, among other things, assess the growth and development of children. According to an article in Dr. Bicuspid, dentists in Japan have been performing health checkups to screen children for developmental disorders collectively with other health professionals using a mouth rinsing function test (MRFT). The test analyzes the oral function in pediatric patients and seeks to determine the relationship between developmental disorders and oral function.

The study found about 30 percent of patients were suspected of having developmental disorders based on the MRFT assessment. Children

suspected of having developmental disorders had significantly poor

oral function. Although there were some children without suspected disorders who also had poor oral function.

Researchers concluded it is challenging for dentists and hygienists to diagnose developmental disorders based solely on the results of the MRFT. However, dentists play a crucial part in diagnosing and treating patients with developmental disorders.

For example, children with autism spectrum disorder often have poor oral health due to hyperreactivity to sensory input, making it difficult to maintain good oral hygiene. The study authors urge that collaboration with other health professionals is crucial for early screening and child support during their development, as well as ensuring good oral health and improvement in oral function.
